# What to look for

- You might want to look for “scientific papers”, i.e. papers written by scholars – whether in the field of economics or other fields – to the purpose of spreading the results of their researches to the scientific community.
- First, you have to distinguish between:
  - Unpublished papers
  - Published papers

# Unpublished papers

- Unpublished papers are research articles that have not been published in scientific, peer-reviewed, journals yet.
- They basically are provisional drafts that scholars want to submit to the attention of the scientific community to receive feedback on the strengths and weaknesses of their work.
- A research article can be in its “draft-stage” for even several years before being submitted, and eventually published, in a journal.

# Unpublished papers

- In order to receive feedback from their peers:
  - 1) Scholars usually present their draft papers at research seminars, workshops, conferences.
  - 2) Include them in at least one working papers collection.
  - 3) Often (not always) include them in “personal repositories” (e.g. [MPRA](#), [Arxiv](#), [Academia.edu](#), [ResearchGate](#)) to make the paper available to anyone potentially interested in reading it (e.g. their followers) and make them available on their **personal webpages**.
- After having received some feedback and having refined their draft accordingly, authors usually submit the paper to some international journal for publication.

# Published papers

- After the authors' submission to a journal, a new **long and slow process** begins.
  - 1) An editor, or a board of editors, quickly reviews the paper, to assess whether it may be worth of publication in the journal or not.
  - 2) In case they believe it is not worth, they reject it (so called "desk rejection"). A desk rejection can take between 1 day and 3 months, depending on the busyness (and fairness) of the editors.
  - 3) In case of desk rejection, the authors will send the paper to a different journal and the process will start again from point 1.

# Published papers

- 4) If the editor believes the paper has some potential, she sends it to “reviewers”. The process of finding appropriate reviewers who are available and willing to assess the paper can take from a few days up to two months (in some unfortunate cases).
- 5) Reviewers are scholars expert in the field who must evaluate the paper, assessing its methodological rigour, originality, contribution to the literature and the overall strengths and weaknesses. Reviewers report back to the editor through a generally anonymous “referee report”. Reviewers can take from two months to more than one year to provide a report, depending on how committed they feel to the service and to the editor’s ability to do some moral suasion.

# Published papers

- 6) In their report, reviewers express a “recommendation” to the editor. They can advise the rejection of the paper, or its reconsideration after some suggested revisions. Revisions can be “minor” or, as in most of the times, “major”.
- 7) At this point, the editor must take a decision. If even one reviewer suggests rejection, then the paper is usually rejected. The authors must revise the paper according to anonymous reviewers’ feedback anyway, and then submit it again to a different journal. The process starts again from point 1.

# Published papers

- 7) If the editor, based on reviewers' feedback, still thinks the paper has potential, she sends it back to the authors for revision.
- 8) The authors revise the paper according to reviewers' and editor's feedback. The revision usually takes from one to several months depending on its extension and difficulty.
- 9) After having revised the paper, the authors "resubmit" it to the journal.
- 10) The editor sends it back to reviewers (possibly the same anonymous ones that performed the review at the first round) and the process starts again from point 6.

# Published papers

- 11) At each round it is always possible that reviewers give a negative feedback on the nth revision thereby soliciting rejection by the editor.
- 12) Round after round, however, rejection is less and less likely.
- 13) After a number of rounds (usually 3 or 4), the editor takes a final decision of acceptance or rejection. To reach this point, a review process can take up to two years. In some unfortunate cases, it can even take 3-5 years.
- 14) If you consider the time for the previous submissions (and rejections) you can see how long – and how much effort and patience – it takes to publish a paper!

# Published papers

- Thus, published papers generally are refined works whose elaboration has taken several years.
- But they are not necessarily “new” papers.
- In the following slides, we will see where to look for published papers on the web.

- Every Sapienza student has free access to the Sapienza Library System (*Sistema Bibliotecario Sapienza*, SBS, both in and off campus (i.e. from outside Sapienza network)).



# Ideas

- A fundamental source for searching both published and unpublished articles is IDEAS.
- IDEAS the largest bibliographic database dedicated to Economics and available freely on the Internet. Based on [RePEc](#) (Research Papers in Economics) it indexes over 2,200,000 items of research, including over 2,000,000 that can be downloaded in full text.
- This site is part of a large volunteer effort to enhance the free dissemination of research in Economics, [RePEc](#), which includes bibliographic metadata from over 1,900 participating [archives](#), including all the major publishers and research outlets. IDEAS is just one of several [services](#) that use RePEc data.

# Are all journals alike?

- The standards that a journal uses to determine publication can vary widely. Some journals, such as [Nature](#), [Science](#), [PNAS](#), and [Physical Review Letters](#), have a reputation of publishing articles that mark a fundamental breakthrough in their respective fields.
- In economics, such a reputation is generally associated to those that are widely considered the “top 5 journals”: *American Economic Review*, *Econometrica*, *Journal of Political Economy*, *Quarterly Journal of Economics*, *Review of Economic Studies* (in alphabetical order).

# Are all journals alike?

- Articles in scientific journals are highly technical, representing the latest theoretical research and experimental results in the field of science covered by the journal. They are generally incomprehensible to anyone except for researchers in the field and advanced students (like you!).
- Journals can be:
  - Generalist, in the case they aim to cover the entire discipline (e.g. economics, sociology, etc. Examples are: AER, QJE, RES, JPE, *Econometrica* and some second-tier journals such as Econ J, JEEA, Int Econ Rev etc. in economics).
  - Field journals, in the case they limit their scope to a specific field or sub-field (e.g. labour economics, health economics, behavioral economics, economic theory, macroeconomic dynamics, experimental economics etc.)
  - Although being “generalist” in principle, some journals are known for welcoming some approaches and topics more than others.

# Are all journals alike?

- In behavioral economics, the most reputable journals are Games and Economic Behavior, Journal of Economic Behavior and Organization, Journal of Economic Psychology, Kyklos, Journal of Behavioral and Experimental Economics.
- Actually, generalist journals publish a lot of behavioral contributions.

# Are all journals alike?

- In addition, there are fields – and related journals – that cover specific topics from different disciplinary perspectives. Remarkable examples are: *Social Networks* (Sociology and Economics), *Evolution and Human Behavior* (Biology, Behavioral Sciences), *Computers in Human Behavior* (Psychology, Communication Sciences), etc.
- It is also common for journals to have a regional focus, specializing in publishing papers from a particular country or other geographic region, like the *Journal of African Economies*, *Journal of Asian Economics*, etc.

# Impact factor

- In many fields, an informal hierarchy of scientific journals exists; the most prestigious journals in a field tends to be the most selective in terms of the articles they will select for publication, and will also have the highest [impact factor](#).

# Impact factor

- The impact factor (IF) of an academic journal is a measure of its influence in the scientific debate.
- It reflects the yearly average **number of citations** to recent articles published in that journal.
- It is frequently used as a proxy for the relative importance of a journal within its field.
- Journals with higher impact factors are often deemed to be more important than those with lower ones.
- Impact factors have a large, **but controversial**, influence on the way published scientific research is perceived and evaluated.

# Journals rankings

- Journals rankings – based on impact, reputation, or on a combination of the two – are often used by departments to assess candidates to academic positions.
- Examples of publicly accessible rankings are:
  - [Scimago journals ranking](#).
  - [Ideas ranking](#).
  - [Social Sciences Google Scholar ranking](#).
  - [Scopus journals rankings](#).

# Are all journals alike?

- Do not rely on impact metrics and rankings too much.
- What really matters is **reputation!**

# Are all journals alike?

- To the purpose of the assignments you will undertake within the course of Econ of Networks, I recommend to have a look at the last two or three years' issues of the following journals (which are all accessible free of charge through Sapienza network).

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- American Economic Review
- Econometrica
- Journal of Political Economy
- Proceedings of the National Academy of Science
- Quarterly Journal of Economics

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
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
